
Why do mammals have different teeth?

The teeth that mammals have in their mouths match the food that they eat. Mammals' teeth can look different from each other.

There are four main types or kinds of teeth.

- 1. Canines Cut and tear food up.
- 2. Molars Chew, grind and crush food.
- 3. Incisors Grab, slice, or cut food.
- 4. Premolars Help incisors and canines grind and mix food.

Carnivores

Carnivores, or meat eaters, will have longer and sharper teeth devoted to cutting and gripping food since they do not eat plants.

A few types of mammals with long, razor sharp teeth are lions, tigers, cheetah, and leopards. Wolves, wild dogs, foxes, hedgehogs, meerkats and dolphins.









Glossary Source NOUN (plural sources) The place where something has come from.

Variety *NOUN* (plural varieties)

Different kinds of the same thing.

Herbivores

Herbivores, or plant eaters, will have more teeth for crushing nuts and berries and for grinding grass and plants.

These teeth tend to be wide and flat. A few kinds of mammals that have flat teeth for chewing and griding plants are horses, zebras, buffalo, elephants, cows, and giraffes.





Fish like sharks and reptiles like alligators or crocodiles are also carnivores.

Omnivores

This group have all kinds of teeth, including canines, incisors, and flat teeth.

These mammals eat a variety of foods that come from both meat and plant sources.

Examples of these mammals are

- bears
- raccoons
- pigs
- warthogs





They often drop down on their front "knees" to eat.


